Freemasonry teaches men many valuable lessons; one that is often looked is Patriotism. During the Candidate's journey through the three degrees, he is told that he should be a peaceful citizen of whatever he lives. He is taught to follow the dictates of his conscience in Civil, as well as Spiritual, matters. After taking the Third degree, he is left to his own devices and few members think back on the more obscure lessons such as Patriotism. I freely admit that I, myself, am guilty of exactly that. Recently I was reminded of that shortcoming and took steps to remedy the situation.

On October 22, 2007, I was Initiated into Harry S. Truman No. 113, The Grand Order of the Sword of Bunker Hill. During the ceremony, Candidates are reminded of the important role the Fraternity played during the Revolutionary War. The Order is a "side degree" that is open any Master Mason, by invitation. "Side degrees" used to be a large part of the Craft, from the early 1700's through the early 1900's. This is especially true during the period of the late 1800's. Men of that time devoured all that Freemasonry had to offer and demanded Inventive Brothers cranked out specialty degrees by the score to keep up demand. Many of these have been lost to the tides of time. Sometimes, a Masonic Scholar gets lucky and finds a ritual for one stashed away in a collection somewhere. The Mortar and Pestle degree was one that was saved in this manner. That particular degree was created for practitioners of the Healing Arts in the aftermath of the Civil War.

The last thirty years of the 20th Century and these first years of the 21st, have not been kind to the Craft. Our losses due to death versus gains through Initiation are starting to plateau. We can't start thinking about the light at the end of the tunnel, just yet. The problem of membership retention is waiting in the wings, and still needs to be addressed. Many of our new members run to the Shrine, and never come back; while others lose interest because we fail to deliver on the promises we made to them.

With Lodges, RAM Chapters, Cryptic Councils, and Templar Commanderies consolidating or surrendering their Charters, it is time to finally address the problem. In order to secure our future, maybe we need to take a couple of steps back. Maybe it's time to bring back the "side degrees." Not as full fledge organizations in themselves, but as a means to spotlight various aspects of Freemasonry, etc. Imagine a Lodge room packed to capacity, just to see one of these degrees exemplified. It's not so far fetched as it sounds The fasted growing Masonic body in North America is the Allied Masonic

Degrees. The AMD is an invitational body of the York Rite that is open to Royal Arch Masons. Its purpose is to research and preserve the "side degrees." In addition to the Mortar and Pestle, they maintain and exemplify the Order of the Bath; Knight of Constantinople; Royal Ark Mariner; St. Lawrence the Martyr; Grand Tyler of Solomon; Red Branch of Erin; Order of the Cork; Excellent Mast; and the Order of the Secret Monitor. Just some food for thought.

Treasurer's Report RWB Lawrence Cameron, PM

Brethren I feel that I must apologize to some of you. The dues committee, which I am the Chairman, mistakenly used an older roster to establish the dues for each brother. I discovered that the older roster had not been updated for the 50 year and Endowed members which I think resulted in some brethren receiving wrong dues notices. Those wrong notices are primarily the former Westport Lodge members who affiliated with us. I cannot tell if your dues notice is correct or not. If you are an 50 year member your dues are \$4.00 and if you are an Endowed member your dues are \$5.00. If you are both Endowed and a 50 year member vour dues are \$4.00. Although these fees are listed under dues, they are actually special assessments levied against every brother by the Grand Lodge.

Many of our brethren who have not kept current with Grand Lodge law are under the impression that if they are Endowed, a 50 year member or both they do not pay anything. This is wrong brethren. You do not pay normal lodge dues of \$35.00 nor Grand Lodge per capita tax of \$14.50. But you are responsible for Grand Lodge assessments.

These assessments are to be paid by every brother and are exclusive of normal dues and Grand Lodge per capita tax.

Those special assessments are:

CHIPS Program. Paid by every member Grand Lodge Insurance

\$1.89(rounded up to \$2.00) Paid by

every member

Public Relations \$1.00 Paid by every member except 50 yr

Paid by every member except 50 yr members

If you did, please remark the dues notice accordingly and be sure and enclose it with your remittance. They will be double checked against the current roster. Also if any of you remitted too much we will contact you to remedy the error. (Oct 26) Brothers Charles Farris and Jim Payne received the Royal Arch Masonic degrees at the York Rite Festival at Independence Masonic Temple. Attending from the William F. Kuhn chapter in support of the initiates were Companions Mike Lluellen, High Priest; Frank Chester, King; Mel Tacke, Royal Arch Captain; Johnnie Nemec Secretary and John Arterburn, Past High Priest.

On December 4, William F. Kuhn Chapter No. 139, RAM had its Official Visit from EC Steve Anderson, District Deputy Grand High Priest. He was accompanied by EC Roy Thomas, Grand Master of the First Veil. There were eleven Royal Arch Masons in attendance, the two distinguished guests and nine Chapter members. This marked the first time that the Chapter was able to open on the Royal Arch degree in almost a year. It was also the first time both of our new members, Comp. James Payne and Comp. Charlie Farris were in attendance. EC Anderson encouraged all present to visit other Chapters to show support and actively promote Royal Arch Masonry whenever we can. One of the other things brought up was that Chapter High Priests could wear Jewish Yarmulkes, instead of normal hats. High Priests that choose the varmulke will not have to remove them as they are traditional

Royal Arch Masonry is the next step in the York Rite and is open to any Master Mason in good standing.

Royal Arch Masonry was founded in Boston in 1797. One of the most fascinating aspects of Royal Arch Masonry has always been how so many men, from so many different walks of life, can meet together in peace and never have any political or religious debates. No Rite of Freemasonry covers the world so much as does Royal Arch Masonry. In every country of the earth, on every continent and on many isles of the sea, will be found Royal Arch Chapters, eager and willing to receive their companions from other parts of the world into that full fellowship that characterizes Royal Arch Masonry. All Royal Arch Masons believe in one God and in respect for each other. Royal Arch Masonry contains one simple, plain statements of Truth, easily understandable and helpful in our relation to life. Lodge symbolism deals with lessons of the material side of life. The Chapter degrees, and particularly the Royal Arch, deal with the spiritual side of life.

Royal Arch Masonry is the logical step for every Master Mason to take. If after becoming a Royal Arch Mason, you desire to continue your studies, you may take the Council Degrees and the Commandery Orders, both of which are illustrative of and carry forward the principles of the Royal Arch. Any Royal Arch Macon will eagerly propose your name as a candidate for the advancement in the mysteries of Anyone Freemasonry. seeking Membership in the Royal Arch must sign a Petition, stating his age, occupation and place of residence. Members of the Chapter vote by ballot. To be accepted, the ballot must be unanimous What has attracted so many Brethren to seek further light in Royal Arch Masonry?? The Royal Arch Degrees was considered most important in the early years of Freemasonry and so dogmatic was the Mother Grand Lodge - from which all Speculative Masonry derives - that in 1813, when the two grand lodges in England united, a firm and solemn landmark was adopted and placed in the Articles of Union to guide Masons throughout the world forever on this matter: "Pure Ancient Freemasonry consists of but three degrees, that of Entered Apprentice, Fellow Craft, and Master Mason, including the Supreme Order of the Holy Royal Arch."

The Chapter of Royal Arch Masonry consists of four degrees, Mark Master, Past Master, Most Excellent Master, and Royal Arch Mason. The Mark Master **Degree** is believed to have originated as a ceremony of registering a craftsman's mark in those years distinguished by operative craft masons and their temple building. It was later developed into a full-fledged degree by the Masonic fraternity as we know it today, Some scholars say it was the earliest degree and may predate all others by many years. It is highly regarded by students in all Masonry, teaching lessons that have proven of value in all walks of life. Some Grand Lodges place so high an eminence on the Mark Master Degree, that they confine it to the jurisdiction of a separate grand body, the Grand Lodge of Mark Masters. The Past Master Degree came into being because originally the degree of Royal Arch was conferred by the Symbolic (Blue) Lodge only on actual Past Masters. This degree was instituted to make it possible for all worthy Brethren to receive the Royal Arch degree. The first record of its conferral is found in 1768 in England. The Most **Excellent Master Degree** is a product of American innovation. It was conferred in a Royal Arch Chapter as early as 1783 in Middletown, Conn. It is by far the most spectacular degree in all Freemasonry. It is the only degree that brings forcibly to our attention the completion and dedication of King Solomon's Temple. The Royal Arch Degree is the climax of Ancient Craft Masonry and Masonic

Symbolism. It is described as "the root and marrow of Freemasonry." It is the complete story of Jewish History during some of its darkest hours. Jerusalem and the Holy temple are destroyed, The people are being held captive as slaves in Babylon. Here you will join with some slaves as they are set free to return home and engage in the noble and glorious work of rebuilding the city and the Temple of God. It is during this rebuilding that they make a discovery that brings to light the greatest treasure of a Mason -- the long lost Master's Word. Many historians have traced the earliest origins of the Royal Arch Degree to Ireland, late in the 17th century and in England in 1738, In 1752, ambulatory or military warrants for Lodges were introduced. This was instrumental in placing the Royal Arch Degree on a par with the Master Mason Degree. Military lodges were greatly responsible for planting Freemasonry in the Colonies and also gave birth to the use of the Mark and Royal Arch degrees in the "New World." Lodge records show that the Royal Arch Degree was conferred at Fredericksburg No. 4 on December 12, 1753. George Washington was raised in this lodge a few months prior to this date. The value of Royal Arch Masonry will be appreciated by all who are exalted to that most sublime degree, particularly by those who are seeking to complete their Masonic education. It reveals the full light of Ancient Craft Masonry, presents it as a complete system in accordance with the original plan and justly entitles you to claim the noble name of Master Mason For information, contact Bro .Johnnie Nemec, Secretary of the Chapter at (816) 966 9565
